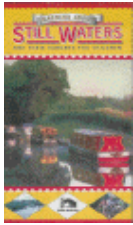

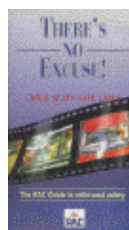


Super Safe With Superted

National Service Framework for older people: The case for and strategies to implement a joint Health Improvement and Modernisation Plan for Falls and Osteoporosis. Accident prevention is one of the four priorities for the NHS as set out in the White Paper Saving Lives: Our Healthier Nation. The recent National Service Framework for Older People (NSF-OP) focuses on falls which result in serious injury in the population of older people. The NSF-OP highlights the link between falls and osteoporosis and sets minimum standards for healthcare. This paper further highlights the link between falls and osteoporosis and the resulting injuries and deaths. Falls and osteoporosis are common in older people. A fall in people with osteoporosis is likely to result in a worse outcome due to the increased risk of fracture. Falls and fractures are associated with high morbidity, mortality and substantial costs.

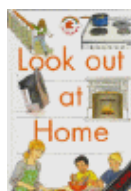

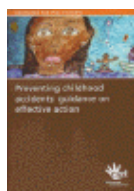

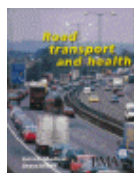

Fire Safety Education Programme Fire is one of the leading causes of accidental injury and death amongst children. On average 50 children under the age of 11 are killed in fires in the UK every year and around 1,800 are injured. The fire safety education programme has been developed by the National Community Fire Safety Centre (part of the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister) to increase children's and young people's awareness of the risks from fire and to help develop the skills they need to be safer adults. It is intended that this programme is delivered by teachers with support from their local Fire and Rescue Service. This site contains curriculum aligned teaching resources for use with 4-11 year olds. The Pack contains a CD rom disc.



Guidelines For Setting Up Community Based Bicycle Helmet Programmes

This manual is based on the bicycle helmet promotion programme run in Reading. The Reading programme was hospital based and aimed it's educational message at the under 16 age group with main emphasis paid to the teenage population. The Reading programme:- showed 45% fall in hospital treated head injuries following bicycle accidents~ and an increase of helmet ownership from 23% to 81% from its start in June 1992 to January 2000~ and an estimated financial saving to health authority has been in the region of £3.5 million. Aims of the helmet programme:~ To teach children the need to wear protective head gear when cycling~ To modify behaviour and allow young people to make a "safe choice".~ To increase helmet wearing among youngpedal cyclists~ To promote cycling as a healthy activity~ To reduce mortality and morbidity resulting from bicycle related head injuries
